

ASH CHURCH WALKS - No.11 (12 July 2015) (Borough Green - Platt - Basted - Ightham - Borough Green)

Essentially the same walk as Local Circuit PW2. Somewhat suburban and then briefly industrial for the first mile or so (be prepared for temporary variations round the quarry in Directions 4-7), but the route soon emerges into pleasantly scenic countryside alternating with woodland. The views from Ightham Warren (around Direction 29) are particularly fine.

Roads and hindrances:

The main road in Ightham (A227) is tricky and, whether or not you cross to the George and Dragon, will need extra care. Otherwise, the roads you walk along are either reasonably quiet or have safe walkways.

The crossing and re-crossing of the A25 (Directions 12 and 44) are moderately busy but should present little difficulty; and the two or three minutes through the industrial estate (9) require no more than ordinary care.

At all costs avoid getting drawn on to the A227 south of Ightham (30), but take one of the cricket-field options described.

Notes taken: June and July 2015

The start and finish is at <u>Borough Green, Western Road car park</u> (TN15 8AL) – currently £1.20 for 6 hours, free at weekends and on bank holidays.

1		Leave the car park by the main vehicle exit into Western Road and turn right, crossing when convenient. At the end turn left along the main Wrotham Road and use the crossing to go along the right-hand pavement. Go ahead out of Borough Green, passing Stone Court, The Avenue and Wye Road on the right. (Between Stone Court and The Avenue you can briefly escape the main road by using a grassy area alongside.)	608 573	
2	7	[Map point] Then, at a lamp-post just after last houses on both sides, and just before the road swings decisively to the left, look for a metal swing-gate in the hedge to the right. Go through it and over a footbridge into an open field. [!!F!!] Go slightly to the left across this field towards a stile and wooden footbridge (next to a prominent water installation).	612 579	
3	10	Cross these and go ahead along a grassy path with a barbed-wire fence on the right.		
4	13	(Currently) turn left, as directed, around quarry workings.		
5	14	Turn right alongside the barbed-wire fence, with a big field to your left.		
6	17	Follow the path as it turns right with the fence, with a ditch now on your left.		0.92
7	18	Turn left with the path, into trees.		
8	21	At a T-junction of paths turn right towards a big metal gate.

27	87 After the brow of the first hill go ahead, ignoring the right fork

28	88	At the farm buildings continue straight ahead uphill.		
29	90	Keep straight on on the public right of way, alongside the line		
		of trees on the left (not forking to the right).

30	93	[Map point] Reach the top edge of the cricket field.		
		[Strictly speaking the mapped right of way goes all the way to the left and down on to the hazardous A227 before climbing back and		
		returning along the far boundary! This is unreasonable. At worst it		
		would make sense, if discouraged by cricketers in the clubhouse, to go to the left and then clockwise round the field, adding about one		
		minute to the stated time; but the following direct route is surely not		
		one which could seriously be objected to.]		
		Go ahead to pass the cricket clubhouse and go on to the far right-hand corner of the field.		
31	95	Continue along the left-hand edge of the field.		
32	99	Go down steps and turn right along the road (Mill Lane).		
33	100	Just after Mill Lane House on the right, turn left down the		
		footpath (currently unsignposted).		
34	103	At the T-junction of paths at the end, turn left. Follow the path		
		as it goes steeply up, then down, and then down some steps		
35	106	alongside a road merging from the right.	597 567	
36	106 108	After the steps turn left at the minor crossroads. After the road swings to the right, reach the war memorial. To	397 367	5.19

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FOR THOSE WHO WALK WITH THEIR DOGS

I do not venture to give advice about walking with your dog. As well as the joys, you will be well aware of the issues involved, and particularly that relationships between dogs and other countryside animals potentially involve mutual suspicion, or worse.

But what this footnote does try to do, in response to requests, is to give some indication of the nature of the walk from a dog's point of view, to enable you to decide whether it is suitable.

The percentage distances on the right (on the next page) should be self-explanatory.

The information in the middle column may look a bit cluttered, but I think it should enable you (if the detail is of interest) to mark up within a few minutes a print-out of the walk notes, so that you have some idea what might be round the next corner.

The risk in all this is that **things change so quickly** in the agricultural working world; and what I describe might become misleading after subsequent changes. I have done my best, but there is no guarantee that you will find the information up to date!
