
ASH CHURCH WALKS - NO. 19



<u>ASH CHURCH WALKS - No.19 (1 July 2018)</u> - 5.73 miles (Cobham - Camer Park - Luddesdown - Henley Street - Cobham)

Orchards at first, then the grand open space of Camer Park, sandwiched between sections of the Wealdway. The tea-room at the end of Camer Park provided a welcome break, and my silly error at 21 caused some amusement, followed by the satisfaction of the team effort in navigating back on to the route. Then scenic Luddesdown, and back, over Henley Down, to the start.

Roads and hindrances:

Just a couple of reasonable climbs, which the group took in its stride.

Notes taken: September 2018

The start and finish is at Cobham Church (DA12 3BG).

1		From the main road through Cobham go into the churchyard	669 685	
		and start along the path around the west (right-hand) end of		
		Cobham Church. Follow the path - the one which is a few		
		yards to the right of the church, not the narrower one which		
		follows the church building itself.		
2	2	At the first opportunity (just before a stile on the left) turn right		
		along an unsignalled path. There is a bench on the right, and a		
		MKG ahead.		
3		Go through the MKG and beyond it turn about 20 degrees left		
		through the fruit trees.		
4	5	Cross a roadway and continue straight ahead across an open		
		field, a few yards to the left of the first of two pylons, then		
		about 40 yds. to the right of the second one.		
5	7	Go on, very slightly left, back into the orchard, on the path		
		which crosses diagonally through the lines of trees.		
6	8	Go over a grassy crossing track and adjust by two rows to the		
		right to pick up again the diagonal path through the gaps.		
7	10	[Map point] Continue ahead, ignoring the alternative route to		
		the right.		
8	11	Cross another grassy area and again adjust by two rows to the		
		right to find and follow the continuation of the diagonal path		
		after about 25 yds		
9	12	Briefly zigzag across one row, right then left, to resume the		
		diagonal path.		
10	13	Go through the MKG, cross the road, find the gap opposite	633 677	
		and continue ahead beyond, on a clear path diagonally through		
		the trees, towards a bridge over the railway.		
11	16	[!!F!!] Cross the bridge, and continue, slightly right, across the		0.85
		large field, passing about 40 yds. to the left of the pylon.

12	23	After passing though a screen of undergrowth at the end, turn		
		right along the broad path (now briefly joining the Wealdway).		
13	26	Where the Wealdway swings away to the right, instead go		
		straight ahead, through a MKG into trees, a side entrance into		
		Camer Park. Go ahead for about 100 yds. along the winding		
		track through the trees.		
14	27	Then turn left along a broad crossing path.		
15		[Map point] And then right, through the edge of the trees and		
		into the open space of Camer Park. The line is now straight		
		ahead, passing a litter bin and going midway between benches		
		dedicated to Terry Bartholomew on the left and Eileen Martin		
		on the right.		
16	30	Go immediately past another bench (John Henry Raven) and		
		then a few trees, continuing reasonably close to the right-hand		
		edge of the large open field.		
17	33	Beyond another litter bin pass the back of an information board	652 670	
		and continue straight along the broad, partly woodchip, track,	002070	
		heading, finally over a grassy space, between the car park on		
		the right and the refreshment area and toilets (currently open)		
		on the left.		
18	35	Turn left out of the car park on to the road.		1.81
19	43	Reach and pass through a gap on the left, beside a redundant		1.01
	10	MKG, and continue ahead along the right-hand edge of a huge		
		field.		
20	49	About 40 yds. after bending leftwards at the end of the field,		
	19	follow the path down a dip, then up again to the right, in trees.		
21	50			
		[This is what was supposed to happen! Deep in conversation I		
		overlooked this Direction, and led the group to the right here, instead		
		of at 22. In the event we improvised our way ahead to rejoin the		
		intended route at 25.]		
		[!!F!!] Emerging from the trees, go very slightly left and follow		
		the broad path between the fields, heading towards the left-		
		hand edge of the trees in the middle distance.		
22	53	Pass through those trees, and immediately after them turn		
		right, along the field edge, with the trees now on your right.		
23	56	At the end of the field go ahead into trees.		
24	57	At the end of the trees turn right into a broader path, now		2.88
		joining the Wealdway.		
25	59	Go straight ahead, ignoring paths to left and right, and go		
		down and then up, along the left-hand edge of a rough field,		
		passing under power lines which cross at an angle.		
26	62	Having continued to the corner at the very end (ignoring a	664 667	
		crossing path just before it) follow the path as it bends		
		leftwards into trees, then winds on towards a MKG.		
27	63	Go through the MKG and turn right to go down along the		<u> </u>
		right-hand edge of a field.

29	[65]	At the end of the steps turn left along the top, left-hand edge of		
		the large sloping field.		
30	68	[Map point] [!!F!!] Reaching a waymark, turn right to go		
		steeply down, directly across the field, heading towards a small		
		gap in the hedge below. (Bearing 165.)		
31	70	Go through the gap and on, down even more steeply.		
32		At the bottom, turn slightly right to go up along the left-hand		
		side of a field, keeping on the right of the line of trees, when it		
		begins about 100 yds. further on.		
33	73	Up at the end, go through the metal gate, and follow the track		
		as it winds left and right and up to the road.		
34	74	Cross the road and go up the steps directly opposite and		3.57
		through the MKG at the top. [!!F!!] Then, very slightly		
		leftwards, head across the field towards the right-hand edge of		
		the trees in the middle distance ahead. (Bearing 170.)		
35	76	Reaching those trees, turn left to walk along the right-hand	668 662	
		edge of the field, with the trees now alongside you on the right.		
36	78	At the end go through the MKG and down steps to the road.		
		Turn right along it.		
37	79	Turn left on to a narrow footpath opposite the entrance to		
		Luddesdown Church.		
38	80	Go through a wooden kissing gate, and then ahead along and		
		up the edge of a huge sloping field.		
39	82	Reaching a wooden kissing gate on the left go through (or		
	"	round) it and ahead, steeply up, into trees.		
40	83	[Map point] Emerge at the edge of a large field, and turn left		
		along its edge.		
41	86	When the trees on the left come to an end, continue ahead over		
		a small open area towards the left-hand edge of more trees		
		ahead, and on reaching them go ahead alongside them.		
42	87	Just before the field begins to drop more steeply, go through a		
		gap on the right to join the road, and follow it downhill.		
43	89	At the bottom turn left, then after about 60 yds. follow the road		4.24
		as it swings to the left alongside the Golden Lion.		
44	90	After passing a working yard on the left, at a point where the		
		road bends slightly to the right, take the footpath which forks		
		away up to the right through a wooden kissing gate.		
45	91	After a further 40 yds. turn right to go quite steeply up along		
		the field-edge path, keeping the field on your left.		
46	98	[Map point] Reach a bench (commemorating the silver jubilee		
		of the local rights-of-way group) and immediately afterwards		
		turn right through a gap and follow the winding path up		
		among trees, partly helped by steps.		
47	99	[!!F!!] Emerge through a wooden kissing gate and continue		
		along the clear path, which goes somewhat leftwards up to the		
		top of the rise, and then down to a wooden kissing gate at the		
		edge of more trees.		
48	104	Go through the gate and on, down through the trees.

49	[104]	[!!F!!] Cross a stile and go diagonally across the field towards a		
		stile in the fence at the bottom, just to the right of the dark		
		buildings.		
50	106	Cross the stile and turn left, briefly, along the road.		4.87
51		[Map point] After about 25 yds. turn right along a narrow alley		
		between fences.		
52	107	[!!F!!] Emerging at the top you have a choice of two tracks		
		which go up across the field. Take the one which goes more or		
		less straight ahead, ignoring the one further to the right.		
53	110	Go through the MKG at the top, and on across a piece of open		
		ground to another MKG beyond (not getting drawn across		
		towards the building on the left).		
54	111	Go through this second MKG, and ahead among trees.	668 674	
55	112	Reach a metal gate, and turn right along the field edge.		
56	114	Nearing the end bend rightwards towards gates, pass through,		
		and turn left along the road.		
57	115	Immediately after the railway bridge turn right away from the		5.20
		road, and follow the track as it bends slightly left to start along		
		the left-hand edge of a huge field.		
58	124	At the top go through the metal gate and ahead, alongside the		
		burial ground on the left.		
59	125	Reaching the point where, at Direction 2, you set off towards		
		the orchards, now go straight ahead and retrace your steps to		
		Cobham Church.		
60	127	Arrive back at the starting point at Cobham Church.	669 685	5.73

FOR THOSE WHO WALK WITH THEIR DOGS

I do not venture to give advice about walking with your dog. As well as the joys, you will be well aware of the issues involved, and particularly that relationships between dogs and other countryside animals potentially involve mutual suspicion, or worse.

But what this footnote does try to do, in response to requests, is to give some indication of the nature of the walk from a dog's point of view, to enable you to decide whether it is suitable.

The percentage distances on the right should be self-explanatory.

The information in the middle column may look a bit cluttered, but I think it should enable you (if the detail is of interest) to mark up within a few minutes a print-out of the walk notes, so that you have some idea what might be round the next corner.

The risk in all this is that <u>things change so quickly</u> in the agricultural working world; and what I describe might become misleading after subsequent changes. I have done my best, but there is no guarantee that you will find the information up to date!

\$\$ Again, not a promise that there will be no traffic to worry about. Just a personal judgement of conditions as I have found them.

STILES (2) – Details noted in September 2018, but **subject to frequent change**: Both stiles (in Directions **49** and **50**) have easy gaps.
